Monarch To Visit Ship

RULER OF THE REALM OF ACEY-DUCEY PLANS VISIT TO COLORADO

King Acey-Ducey, greatest of them all, will be with the ship for a month, starting February fifteenth, and will hold court every day during that time. He has sent before him as his ambassador extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary, the Colorado Entertainment Officer, who, in a recent interview, made very clear the wishes of his great master.

The gist of his momentous announcement is that King Acey-Ducey wishes to extend to all hands an opportunity to joust for his favor over acey-ducey boards. He wishes each division to hold an elimination contest to determine who shall represent it in the great final tourney to be held in his Court. The man who, by his staunch loyalty purity of heart, and supernatural ability to talk to the dice, wins the King's favor, will receive not only a personal mark of commendation from a grateful ruler, but will win for his division's trophy case a silver shield engraved with his name.

The Ship's Entertainment Officer, in the absence of his master, directs all hands to begin at once to discover the man who will represent each division in the final tourney, so that there may be no delay in the Court when the great King comes over the side on February fifteenth. The ambassador added that while he does not wish to hurry any one in such an important matter, he is well acquainted with the uncertain temper of King Acey-Ducey, who will brook no procrastination by his subjects.

Pulling Races

MARINE AND FIRST ENLISTMENT CREWS PLACE IN PULLING RACE

With its First Enlistment and Marine whaleboat crews taking fourth and sixth places respectively the Colorado scored 16 points toward the General Excellence Trophy and retained eighth place in the standing of ships for that award.

The First Enlistment crew, coxswained by Dugal of the fifth division, pulled the best race of the day, finishing only three seconds behind the Maryland boat which won the event. The crew pulled a powerful, even stroke and the closeness of the race is indicated by the small difference of time between the first four boats. The Colorado time was 15:15 while the Maryland finished in 15:12.

Sergeant Coffin led the Marine crew, pulling against the Maryland Marines, whose time for the mile and one half course was the best of the day, pulling the race in 14:49. The Colorado sea soldiers finished sixth in this race to gain the points for that place.

The selected crew, coxswained by Chief Boatswain Mate Malloy, fell behind in the fast pace set by the Arizona crew, winding up in 8th place. The Arizona crew negotiated the distance in 15:05.

Ensign Witherow trained the First Enlistment crew and the result of the race is indeed gratifying.

BATTLE FORCE FOOTBALL TEAM AND SCHEDULE CANCELLED FOR 1933

The Battle Force Football team, one of the outstanding elevens of the Pacific Coast for the past two years, will not be concentrated during the season of 1933, it was learned recently. Admiral Luke McNamee, Commander Battle Force, issued the order, mailed out by the Battle Force athletic officer, Lieut. Charles Wellborn.

The Battle Force team, headed by Lieut. Tom Hamilton has defeated both the Army and Marine elevens during the past two years and last year won the coveted President's Cup.

Reasons advanced for the discontinuance of the squad were that the main object of the team, that of playing the Army, which team also will be out of competition next season, would not be possible, and that due to schedule arrangements of the University of California the Memorial Stadium would not be available for the Army game, thereby taking away the chief support of the team, and making impossible the financing of the squad.

In event the Army team returns for battle next year, the Navy will also enter a squad, the order said. Tentative plans are underway for the defense of the President's Cup in which arrangements are being made to select a squad from battleship teams to play the Marine eleven. Plans also were made for the playing of several charity games.

The Colorado basketball team closed its 1933 battle force basketball season last Saturday evening, winning the final tilt from the Oklahoma team to the tune of 48 to 44. A last minute rally by the Oklahoma team was not strong enough to overcome the big lead the Broncs had piled up during the first period.

Allan, Fitzgerald and Olnhausen each scored 12 points for the Broncs for a three way split of leading score honors. Woodworth, injured early in the season, played part of the second half, his first game of the year.

By defeating the Indians, the Colorado team made certain of sixth place in race and the accompanying 14 Iron Man points. The team did exceptionally well for the year, and with a break in two other contests, might have been much nearer the top in the standing.

Ensigns Chittenden and Catlett have done remarkably well with the squad and can feel the task given them, complete, with a "well done" comment. Lieut. Comdr. Ihrig, basketball officer, has aided the team in every way possible and his attitude is in a great way responsible for the success of the team.

In addition to the official games, of which the team won four and lost five, several civilian games have been played, with the Bronc team winning a majority.

"Whity" Myers, captain and forward of the team has been the outstanding player, and is, according to information, being considered as a possible selection on the all battle force team.

Although the official season will not close until the 27th, the Bronc team is assured of sixth place but cannot hope for any higher spot. Despite the outcome of the remaining contests, the Broncs standing will not be affected.
